

CCPC and Same-Sex Marriage

In these last few weeks, the issue of same-sex marriage has taken center stage in our national discourse. North Carolina became the twenty-ninth state to vote a constitutional ban on gay marriage. President Obama declared his personal support for gay marriage, changing his earlier view of rejecting marriage in favor of same-sex unions. Our own congregation also began a discussion in Open Forum sessions presented by our Marriage Task Force. My purpose in writing this article is to clarify what is happening at CCPC.

The Presbyterian Church (USA), the denomination of which we are a part, has long defined marriage as between a man and a woman. In the PC(USA) pastors are specifically forbidden to marry people of the same gender. This creates a particular dilemma for churches in the District of Columbia where same-sex marriage is legal. What will we do when faithful members come to us and asked to be married in the church?

Shortly after same-sex marriages became legal in the District, the Session established a Marriage Task Force “for discernment and education on the role

and stance of CCPC concerning the question of marriage between gay and lesbian couples,” (minutes of the session meeting June 15, 2010). The Task Force has engaged in extensive study of the many considerations involved in the issue, including theology, church polity, and pastoral concerns. To date, the Task Force has met for information sharing and discussion with the Session and Deacons and at two Open Forum presentations. The Task Force will offer more opportunities for education and discussion in the fall. Look for study materials to be made available on the church website this month.

The theological concerns center around the understanding and use of Holy Scripture. Both those who affirm and those who oppose gay marriage can find texts to support their point of view. Biblical interpretation is an important area of study to fully understand the issues involved.

The Presbyterian Church’s polity is based on the belief that God works through the community of faith to reveal God’s will for the people. We struggle

"The Sound of Your Own Silence"
A 30 Day Retreat in the Midst of Life's Busyness
Summer 2012

Wouldn't it be nice to slip away from your busy life and take a 30 day silent retreat? Absolutely, but few of us can carve out that kind of time to be away. Instead, consider taking a 30 day "retreat" right in the midst of life's business. The Connections Committee is offering CCPC members a special resource for use this summer to do just this. This resource from *Scripture Echo* offers a 30 day spiritual formation workbook/journal that will help you to claim silence everyday, in different kinds of ways. Journaling exercises, questions for reflection, prayer ideas, and many suggestions for practicing silence are given.

Explore your relationship with silence. Find out what makes you anxious about silent space and what makes you more peaceful. Explore the gifts that can come as you are silent while those around you are speaking. Discover how unnecessary some of our speaking can be, and how we can "retreat" back into a blessed place of silence, as we do errands, attend meetings, and even eat a meal. You can choose any level of silence that fits your life and your needs; full silence or just few precious minutes a day, or anything in between.

Throughout the 30 days, you will be encouraged in three different areas:

Praying in Silence: Start with just five minutes twice a day, and work your way up to twenty minutes of sheer silence as prayer. Use other prayer methods to enter into silent prayer, where you rest in God's presence with no words at all.

Keeping Silence: In ways that are right for your unique life circumstances, explore different ways of "keeping silence," by refraining from speaking and diminishing the background noise around you.

Reflecting about Silence: Take time to think about and articulate what is happening for you throughout the 30 days.

(Memorial Day weekend to Labor Day weekend.) Transition Assistance Program *up close*

Have you ever wondered where TAP gets the funding needed to serve more than 850 homeless and working poor residents each year? As an outreach mission of the church, we get important financial support from CCPC's Missions Committee, the Gifts of Hope market, a portion of the hunger offerings, and individual contributions of cash, clothing and food. The Souper Bowl of Caring offering collected by CCPC youth during services on Super Bowl Sunday was designated for TAP this year. The church also provides the program's office space and some administrative support.

But TAP also receives grants from outside our church, namely from foundations and charitable organizations who recognize the value of TAP's work in our community. So far this year, we have received grants from the Rotary Foundation (\$5,000), the Blessed Sacrament Christmas tree sales fund (\$500), and the Workers of St. Albans, who run the thrift shop at St. Albans Parish (\$3,500). These organizations have been past supporters as well. Often our foundation grants have come through a connection to someone in the congregation. For example, Howard Davis, an active Rotarian, has kept us apprised of Rotary's grantmaking program. TAP is always interested in new grant possibilities, so **if you have a connection to a foundation or other organization that might be interested in TAP's work, please send us a note at tap@chevyCHASEPC.org** and we will contact you to discuss whether we should prepare a proposal.

Our greatest resource, however, is people. Because of the dedicated corps of volunteers, 90 percent of TAP's funds go to direct client service. More than 40 volunteers—ranging in age from high school seniors to retirees—serve in roles such as client interviewers, greeters, clothing sorters, sandwich makers, and advisory board members. The powerful combination of money and people power is helping lift our fellow residents out of poverty.

Earth Stewards Tips for a Green Summer

As we move closer to the slower pace of summer vacations, barbecues, and lazy days by the pool, here are some tips from the Earth Stewards for a safe, fun, and green summer.

- ◆ As driving for day trips and vacations increases, remember that under-inflated tires cling too much to the road, which puts drag on forward motion and substantially lowers gas mileage. Each car has posted the proper tire pressure, usually on the driver's open door. Use this figure instead of the one on the tires since the front and rear tires differ. Check the pressure as often as you check the oil, and before a trip.
- ◆ Coming out of a rainy spring, be mindful of supplements you may use on your lawn. Choose organic, chemical free fertilizer or your own compost to enrich the soil. Pesticides used on your yard or flower beds are ultimately washed off and carried into the Chesapeake Bay watershed, polluting streams and nearby areas. Ask your local lawn care vendor for organic solutions to common pest problems or research online for "green fertilizer."
- ◆ Looking for fun summer activities? Think green: plant a garden, fly a kite, have a picnic (with local foods and reusable utensils), go walking, hiking, or bird-watching, enjoy a park near your home or take Metro to the National Mall or the National Zoo.

Gray Greenleaf: CCPC Through the Years

On April 21, the Board of Deacons hosted a festive luncheon, "A Trip Down Memory Lane," for 50 year members and their guests. More than 50 people attended the luncheon, shared memories, and enjoyed Deacon Ken Lowenberg on the piano playing favorites from the 40's, 50's and 60's. Marjorie Gray Greenleaf shared her memories of CCPC during the luncheon.

Shortly after my birth in 1922, my parents moved to Quesada Street within walking distance of Chevy Chase Circle. They joined Chevy Chase Presbyterian Church, and the small multi-purpose chapel became our church home. Worship Services, Sunday School, and a wide variety of other events took place in the chapel.



As membership grew, the chapel was unable to accommodate the many church and community activities. Funds were raised to build the current sanctuary with seating capacity of 700. Sunday School classes were held in the fellowship hall under the sanctuary. Curtains were used to separate the classes.

Church circles were formed. The church was thriving and, as always, opened its doors to youth groups, community activities, and even welcomed other denominations. As membership continued to grow, minister of youth and associate pastor positions were created. A Sunday School wing was built to house the growing church population.

Women worked side by side in the kitchen, frequently hosting church sponsored and community happenings. I especially remember a carnival event when, much to my surprise, my mother volunteered to be a Fortune Teller!!!

My mother and aunt (my mother's sister) were active church circle members. They worked together, almost

daily, making dresses for children in Appalachia. Material was expensive in those days, so they often used discarded men's shirts, using the shirt's front buttons as the closure for the back of the dress. Donated trim, rick rack, and lace were added as decoration.

Street cars were the primary mode of transportation. A district line was extended into Maryland, just beyond the church to Chevy Chase Lake where there was a dance pavilion.

I attended nursery school in a farm house on Brookville Road. Now, my nursery school is the well-known La Ferme Restaurant.

Chevy Chase Presbyterian Church has always been an important part of my life...attending Sunday School as a young child, youth group, confirmation, my wedding in 1943, circle membership and another trip down the aisle in 1979 after my first husband's death.



I have been fortunate to celebrate several family baptisms and weddings of my children, grandchildren and great grandchildren at CCPC. I have been truly blessed.

I am proud to belong to a church that continues its long tradition of welcoming and serving the community. CCPC outreach extends beyond our neighbor-



hood to the world. Chevy Chase Presbyterian Church has remained vital and strong through the many changes over the years!

- **Joe Sandman** has graduated from the University of Michigan and will be attend the University of Pennsylvania Law School in the fall.

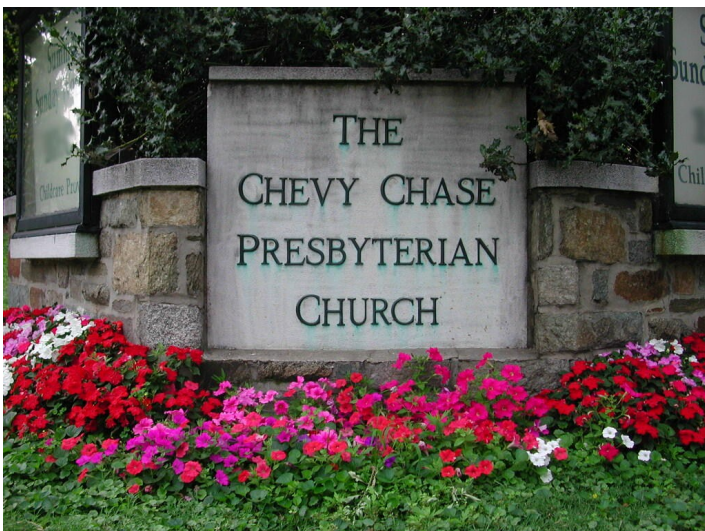

together to know God's will as we seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Because God works through flawed human beings, it is a messy process. The church is constantly evolving and reforming as God has "more truth and light yet to break forth out of his holy Word." (from a sermon by Pastor John Robinson as he sent the Pilgrims off to the Colonies, quoted in the 2010 Book of Order G-18.0101)

As stated above, church polity clearly forbids Presbyterian clergy from performing same-sex marriages. Clergy and sessions of churches that authorize the performing of such marriages risk disciplinary action. Congregations risk expensive legal fees and put clergy at risk for removal from ordained office.

At the PC(USA) General Assembly this summer, the Assembly will consider overtures to change the definition of marriage as "between a woman and a man" to be "between two people." The Assembly will also consider overtures that will allow for more pastoral discretion in whether or not to perform a marriage ceremony. The Task Force will be watching what happens at the assembly very closely.

When speaking of pastoral concerns, the Task Force and I recognize the need for compassion and care for those who might come to be married. How might we minister to them in light of the restrictions? We also recognize a pastoral concern for CCPC. Same-sex marriage raises strong feelings and the congregation is not all of the same mind. People of good faith hold differing understandings of God's purposes in this matter. The intention of the Session in creating the Task Force is to move ahead deliberately, thoughtfully, and prayerfully with humility, respect, and concern for all.

The process this church undertakes to discern its stance on same-sex marriage is my greatest concern. How we make our decision is at least as important as what decision we make. We live in a culture that too easily shuts down conversation before it has had a chance to begin. People have many questions and concerns that need to be heard and considered. We must listen to each other with openness and respect. God has created of us a community of faith and bound us together in love. It is this unity of love, respect and

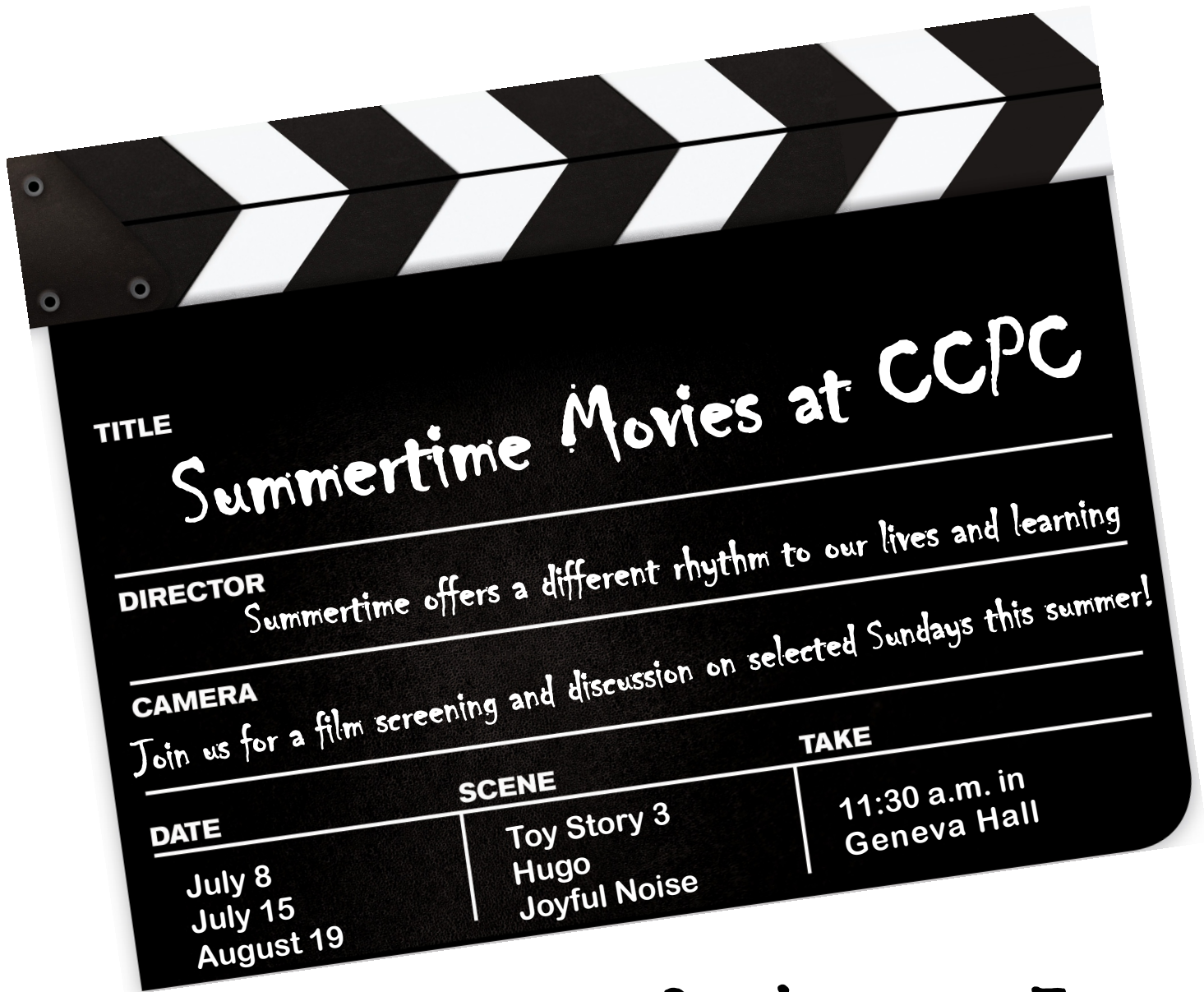

struggle to fulfill God's purposes that gives witness to a divided world that peace and reconciliation are possible even in times of difficult disagreement.

The Marriage Task Force is one of the finest working groups I have known. The process they are leading is a great benefit to the church, as CCPC, and to the church at large. Please keep the members of the Task Force in your prayers as they continue to lead us in this process and work toward making a recommendation to the session on what stance CCPC should take. The time will come to pray for the session as they make that decision. Please take advantage of the opportunities offered to further study and discuss the complexities of the issue and the stance of the church. We have much to learn from each other and God has much to teach us. May God's Spirit guide the whole church in the ways of justice, love, and compassion.
